Money has changed a lot over time. At first, people traded goods and services directly. This was called bartering. However, bartering was difficult because people had to find someone who wanted what they had and had what they wanted.

Around 600 BC, people in Lydia, which is now part of Turkey, started using coins. Coins were made of electrum, a mix of gold and silver. They had a fixed value and were widely accepted, which made trade easier. During the Middle Ages, people in Europe started using coins more. Rulers minted coins and stamped their value on them. However, the value of coins often changed based on how much precious metal they contained.

In the 13th century, people in China started using paper money. Merchants and traders used promissory notes as a convenient way to carry large amounts of money without the risk of theft. This idea later spread to other parts of the world.

In the 17th century, the first central banks were created, such as the Bank of England. These banks issued banknotes, which were promises to pay the bearer the specified amount of money. Banknotes quickly became popular because they were more convenient than carrying heavy coins.

In the 20th century, technology advanced and electronic money was invented. For me, credit cards, debit cards, and digital payment systems made it much easier to handle transactions. Today, most of our financial transactions happen with the click of a button.
